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To My Fellow Citizens of St. Peters,


Once again I am privileged and honored to present to you the St. Peters Police Department's 2012 Annual Report.

# DEPUTY CHIEF'S MESSAGE

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Dear Citizens,

Thank you for your continuing interest in our annual report. As the Deputy Chief, Bureau of Support Services, I serve with the outstanding people who manage and operate our communications, records, and property management systems.

The Police Records Section submits our crime data through the Missouri Incident Based Reporting System (MIBRS). We participate in the Missouri Data Exchange (MODEX) program to share local crime information across the state and to National Data Exchange (NDEX) project. NDEX participants have access to local criminal justice information from across the nation. These services are available without cost to the community and contribute significantly to both local and national crime fighting efforts.

The Police Department continues working on behalf of the City with our regional government partners to implement a new radio network. Our project milestones for 2012 were met, including finalizing local system design and equipment requirements. We anticipate delivery of equipment and installation of mobile radios to begin during the second quarter of 2013, with system completion set for mid-December.

As the Commander of the Bureau of Field Operations, I am privileged to be responsible of all law enforcement activities which include the Criminal Investigations Division, Traffic Division, School Resource Officers and Patrol Officers.

The Criminal Investigations Division continued to preserve a high clearance rate on cases investigated. The Detectives investigate various felony crimes, a majority of which are reported or discovered by our Patrol Division. Also, our patrol officers received a 95% "Customer Satisfaction" rating for the year 2012, which is determined by surveys sent throughout the year to residents and business owners who contacted our department.

After reviewing the statistics for 2012, I noticed a fantastic trend: as our citizen involvement and awareness increased, our major crime decreased. We believe public safety is a joint effort between both the Police Department and the citizens of the City of St. Peters. 

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- **Increase resident/community involvement in our Neighborhood Watch Programs**

The St. Peters Police Department met the objective to add six new Neighborhood Watch Groups in 2012. We now have 37 Neighborhood Watch Groups that help police fight crime in St. Peters. New groups were initiated in neighborhoods based on recommendations by patrol officers due to calls in an area or through analysis of crime reports and calls for service. We have also increased resident participation and involvement in our crime prevention projects by including the information in our “Open Garage Door” letters and through routine correspondence with our residents.



- **Incorporate National Incident Management System methods in day-to-day operations in order to continually assess department and citywide preparedness for emergency situations.**

The St. Peters Office of Emergency Management (OEM) continues to work with various governmental and non-governmental agencies to advance emergency preparedness as well as incident/event management. For example, we participated in the St. Charles County Local Emergency Preparedness Committee, the St. Charles County Community Organizations Active In Disaster Committee, State-wide Emergency Management Exercises (Vigilant Guard, November 2012), and the St. Charles County Health Department Medical Point of Distribution exercise (June 2012). OEM continues to promote multiagency coordination through other various emergency management groups to include STARRS ESponder Focus Group and St. Charles County Citizen Corp Counsel.



- **Continue participation in the acquisition, design, and implementation of the St. Charles County Regional Radio System.**

The St. Charles County Regional Radio System is progressing on schedule for full implementation during the fourth quarter of 2013. The City completed a complete audit of our existing equipment in preparation for delivery of mobile radio equipment during the second quarter of 2013. This system will provide better communication between emergency agencies throughout the region.

- **Reduce the rate of increase for traffic crashes in the City.**

The City experienced a citywide reduction in traffic crashes from 838 in 2011 to 748 in 2012, a decrease of 10.7%.

- **Increase employee safety awareness. Achieve and maintain a zero lost-day record and reduction in property loss and accidents through improved communication, increased individual accountability, safety training, and team action plans.**

During the 2012 Safety Year, the Department achieved a 28.4% decrease in its worker compensation claims. We remain committed to our goal of zero lost-days and reducing property loss and accident claims.



- **Continue a Customer Satisfaction level of 95% by focusing on the City's "IT" philosophy in daily interactions with internal and external customers.**

The Department earned an over-all customer satisfaction rating of 97.4% for 2012. Staff sent out approximately 1091 individual survey requests with a return rate of 24%. The Patrol Division's citizen satisfaction survey results were 95.3% out of a possible 100%. Communications and Records personnel received ratings of 97.2% and 99.7% respectively.

- **Increase use of Field Interview Reporting and entry to assist in identification of suspects.**

The St. Peters Police Department increased its use of field interview reporting from 2011 to 2012 by 80%. An officer may stop a person in a neighborhood to conduct a field interview if he has reasonable suspicion the person could be involved in a crime. If police find out later that a crime took place in that neighborhood, information from the field interview would give police a lead in the case. In 2012, the Police Department processed 84 field interviews. All of the Interview reports are entered into REJIS and Police Server so that they are available for use during investigations.



## St. Peters Police Department Organization

### OFFICE OF THE CHIEF OF POLICE

The Office of the Chief of Police is responsible for the management, direction, and administration of the Department. The Chief of Police is accountable for ensuring that the general functions of the Department are carried out effectively and efficiently.

#### Office of Emergency Management

The Office of Emergency Management is staffed by a Sergeant who is the Director of Emergency Management, and who reports to the Chief of Police. The duties include emergency management, all-hazards planning, coordination and management of the city wide radio system. The sergeant is also in charge of the Community

Emergency Response Team (CERT), which is a citizen volunteer group trained to handle emergency situations.

#### Community & Media Relations Office

The Community/Media Relations Office is staffed by an Officer, who reports to the Chief of Police and whose duties include media and public relations, administration of crime prevention programs, management and administrative reporting, and Citizen Police Academies.

#### Training & Professional Standards Office

The Training & Professional Standards Unit is staffed by a Lieutenant and Sergeant, who report to the Chief of Police and are responsible for the professional development of the members of the Department as well as the creation and maintenance of the standards of conduct for the Department's internal investigations, complaint review/investigation, inspections, promotional process, training, hiring and background investigations.

### BUREAU OF FIELD OPERATIONS

Deputy Chief of Police (with the assignment rank of Major), who reports to the Chief of Police, commands the Bureau of Field Operations. Lieutenants, Sergeants, Detectives, Patrolmen and civilian clerical personnel comprise this unit's staff. The Bureau commander is responsible for the intelligent, coordinated and effective deployment and management of the Department's patrol, uniformed and investigative resources.

#### Patrol Operations Division

Composed of three shifts, each commanded by a Lieutenant, supervised by one or more Sergeants, and reports to the Bureau of Field Operations Commander. This Division provides 24-hour uniformed police services.

#### St. Charles County Regional SWAT Team

This multi-jurisdictional unit is staffed by the departments of the St. Charles County Sheriff, St. Peters Police, O'Fallon Police, Lake St. Louis Police and Wentzville Police. The St. Charles County Ambulance District, Central County Fire and Rescue, and Cottleville Fire Protection District supply tactical medics for the team. The St. Peters

Police Department contributes five police officers as a secondary assignment. Team members train 16 hours per month with a 40-hour training week once per year. The team is activated for tactical situations, including but not limited to armed barricaded subjects, armed suicidal subjects, hostage situations and dignitary protection details.

## Community Services Division

Commanded by a Lieutenant who supervises various units providing specialized service to the community, and reports to the Commander, Bureau of Field Operations. Included within this Division are the following functions:

**Traffic/DWI Enforcement Unit** serves as a flexible enforcement and investigative unit with regard to traffic-related incidents/concerns. A Sergeant, who reports to the Community Services Division Commander, supervises this element.

**School Resource Officer and D.A.R.E. Unit** serves as a flexible enforcement or teaching unit assigned to public or private parochial schools and is responsible for the general policing or D.A.R.E. activities within the schools to which they are assigned.

## Criminal Investigations Division

Commanded by a Lieutenant, who reports to the Commander, Bureau of Field Operations, and is supervised by a Sergeant. This division is responsible for specialized investigations of those types of crimes requiring time and/or expertise beyond the capacity of the patrol force. The Investigations Division is responsible for general investigations including property crimes/crimes against persons, special investigations and youth crimes.

The **Proactive Policing Team (PPT)** became a full-time detail in May 2007. Commanded by a Sergeant, PPT serves as a special assignment enforcement and investigative unit, specializing in a proactive response to selected crime problems.

The **St. Charles County Regional Drug Task Force** serves as a special assignment unit specializing in investigating drug crimes in the St. Charles County area.

## BUREAU OF SUPPORT SERVICES

Deputy Chief of Police (with the assignment rank of Major), who reports to the Chief of Police, commands the Bureau of Support Services. The Bureau is responsible for providing general administrative and operational support to all other elements of the Department as well as other City Government units as directed. In addition, the Bureau Commander exercises direct supervisory control of all budgetary issues, purchasing, and other fiscal management issues subject to the approval of the Chief of Police.

### Police Records Division


A civilian Records Supervisor who reports to the Commander, Bureau of Support Services, supervises the division, which is staffed by civilian personnel and is responsible for the collection, preservation and distribution of official reports generated by this agency as the result of calls for service.

### Communications Division

A civilian Lead Dispatcher, who reports to the Commander, Bureau of Support Services, supervises this division, which is staffed by civilian personnel. The division is responsible for departmental telecommunications and records system data entry on a 24-hour-per-day basis.

### Property Management Unit

A civilian Property Management Coordinator, who reports to the Commander, Bureau of Support Services, supervises the Property Management Unit, which is staffed by civilian employees. The unit is responsible for evidence and property control, photographic services, facility and fleet management, as well as assistance in budget preparation and procurement.

### DEFINITIONS

**Criminal Homicide:** Murder and non-negligent manslaughter are the willful killing of one human being by another.

**Involuntary Manslaughter:** Recklessly cause the death of another person.

**Rape:** Sexual intercourse with another person by force without the victim's consent.

**Robbery:** The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

**Aggravated Assault:** An unlawful attack or attempted attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting bodily injury.

**Burglary:** The unlawful entry or attempted unlawful entry of a structure for the purpose of committing a crime.


**Larceny:** The unlawful taking, carrying, leading or riding away of property from the possession of another.

**Motor Vehicle Theft:** The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle.


**Arson:** The act of knowingly damaging a building or inhabitable structure by starting a fire.





### Traffic Stops & Business Checks





## Available Awards

- **Medal of Honor.** Awarded to a Department member who has given his or her life in the line of duty, or has distinguished himself or herself by the performance of an unselfish act of courage involving imminent danger or hazard to the Department member's own life, with the full knowledge of the risks involved, and is clearly above and beyond the call of duty. Such act must be in the course of furthering justice, or of saving or attempting to save the life of another. The act must be of such high caliber that it clearly distinguishes the member from a lesser form of bravery.
- **Life Saving Medal.** Awarded for an act performed in the line of duty, which through disregard of personal safety or prompt and alert action, results in saving a life.
- **Meritorious Service Medal.** Awarded for highly unusual accomplishment under adverse conditions wherein there existed some degree of hazard to life or limb of the nominee, or where death or injury to another party was clearly prevented by the actions of the nominee.
- **Chief's Letter of Commendation.** Awarded at the Chief's discretion for instances of special recognition for outstanding performance.


